# Activity Week

From Friday 10th November to Thursday 16th November, all students were involved in activity week where they did various workshops/activities.

## Bia Bites

Bia Bites involved students learning about nutrition and eating well for sports activities. In groups, students had to plan menus based on different dietary requirements. The second day, the groups had to cook meals based on their menus.

## Animation

The students used Lego figurines and iMovie to make a stop motion animation movie. They also watched examples of other stop animation movies.

## Law Module

In the law module students watched two short documentaries about various criminal cases and acted out two mock trials. They also listened to the teacher talk a bit about her experiences.

## Leadership and Teamwork / Project Management

The students were divided themselves into groups and each group had to build parts to a giant bridge, with a project leader coordinating the team's efforts. The pieces were then put together and the quickest group completed the bridge in just 50 minutes, while the other group did it in 56. The organisers of this also ran a project management workshop which was very enjoyable and educational.

## PSI

PSI (Personal Safety Ireland) came in to the school to teach a group about safety and self-defence, which are very important skills. The teachers were very good in their methods and the students attending learned a lot about how to defend themselves in various situations.

## TY TV

This workshop was about social media and camera techniques. The students learned how to keep eye contact with a camera, how to read from a prompter and divided into groups to make a scene for a mini movie.

## Drums/Percussion Workshop

In this workshop, the students learned how to play some traditional beats on African style drums. They were allowed to try soloing and they combined everything they learned together at the end of the workshop to play a big piece on the drums.

## Song School

The students who participated in this workshop were divided into 4 different groups and were asked to write a song together. They were also asked to bring in instruments if they had any to make the song easier to write. The song writing process took the majority of the day and the students had to perform their original songs in front of the other groups.

## First Aid

In this workshop students practiced how to help others in a variety of situations. They did CPR, learned how to bandage effectively, what to do in the event of someone fainting or becoming ill, and general other first aid skills. This was a workshop enjoyed by all who did it.

# Christmas Market and Concern Fast


November 23<sup>rd</sup>
